Notes from a Time Sifter Roman Mosaics.

We have all seen these beautiful mosaics on the floors and walls of both Greek and Roman buildings. This artform is everywhere in the former Roman Empire from England to Morrocco and from Spain to Egypt. They are a common feature of both private homes and public buildings. They are an invaluable record of such everyday items as clothes, food, tools, weapons, flora and fauna as well as revealing much about Roman activities like sports, agriculture, and hunting. Some even include humor like the famous "Black Dog" found in the doorway of a villa in Pompeii, that says "Beware of the Dog". We are in awe of the designs and the craftmanship. They are truly amazing pieces of art.





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Mosaics ...

This art form is known as *opus tesellatum*. It is made with small black, white and colored squares measuring between ½" to ½" but fine details are rendered using even smaller pieces as little as 1/8". They are made from materials such as marble, tile, glass, smalto, pottery, stone and

even shells.

The first step is to draw with charcoal an outline of the planned illustration. Then a base is prepared with fresh mortar and the chips positioned as close together as possible with any gaps filled with liquid grout. The finished piece is then cleaned and polished.

A Time Sifters Book Review **River Kings:** A New History of the Vikings from Scandinavia to the Silk Road



A brilliant new history that dramatically reassess how far the Viking world extended.

Dr. Cat Jarman exposes the unexpected routes that Viking travel and trade took - and how these kings of the river were frequent travelers of the Middle East and the Silk Road.

One June day late in the 8th century, Norse seafarers arrived at the English island of Lindisfarne. They waged a savage attack on its unsuspecting abbey, and with this, the Age of the Vikings was born. These roving pillagers spent the next few hundred years raiding and trading a path across Northern and Western Europe. Except, that's not quite true. It's just a convenient place to start the story - a story that has seen radical new discoveries over the past few years.

Dr. Jarman works on the cutting edge of bioarchaeology, using forensic techniques to research the paths of Vikings who came to rest in British soil. By examining teeth that are now over 1000 years old, she can determine childhood diet, and thereby where a specimen was likely born. With radiocarbon dating, she can ascertain a death date down to the



range of a few years.

In 2012, a carnelian bead came into her temporary possession. River Kings sees her trace its path back to 8th-century Baghdad, discovering along the way that

the Vikings' route was far more varied than we might think, that with them came people from the Middle East, not just Scandinavia, and that the reason for all this unexpected integration between the Eastern and Western worlds may well have been a slave trade running through the Silk Road, and all the way to Britain.

River Kings is a major reassessment of the Vikings, and of the medieval world as we know it.

Cat Jarman, PhD, is a bioarchaeologist and field archaeologist specializing in the Viking Age and Viking women. She uses forensic techniques like isotope analysis, carbon dating, and DNA analysis on human remains to untangle the experiences of past people from broader historical narratives. Dr. Jarman

> has contributed to numerous television documentaries as both an on-screen expert and historical consultant, including programs for the BBC, History Chanel, Discovery, among others. She lives in Britain.
